#### **Last Program**



#### From the Docent Committee Alice Bostic, Docent Chairman

Alice Bostic, Chairperson reports that the docents have had an exciting beginning for the year 2008. The history class series entitled From Wagon Roads to New South City has been a huge success. Rachel Abernathy and Barbara Jackson have worked very hard on this project. Over 100 people asked to register and due to the limited space we had at the Polk and Rosedale sites they had to start a waiting list. We are most grateful to the James K. Polk and Rosedale sites and the Levine Museum of the New South for space and help with presenters. We are also extremely grateful to our wonderful speakers who volunteered their time and expertise. Participants were the most dedicated group of students many of us have seen in a long time. They stuck to their seats as though glued through 2-2.5 hours of instruction with one short break. We had to

borrow chairs from Rosedale and Sugaw Creek Presbyterian Church to seat everyone. The classes were held on five Saturday mornings beginning January 26. The group was made up of all ages with the 50 to 70 group being the largest. Some were new to Charlotte. Others were long time residents. All were passionately interested in local history. We are hopeful that some will decide to volunteer at our history sites.

We had our annual board retreat in January. One of the highlights was a luncheon meeting with three of our history site staff, Maile Kim from Levine, Jan McCormick from CMH and Rachel Hooey from Latta. Our focus was looking at their perception of how today's public responds to history sites. Factors they mentioned included an interest in using technology as a learn-

ing tool, a tendency to have a romanticized view of history, a strong family orientation in their response to programs and their short attention spans. All of these factors reflect changes we see throughout our culture on a daily basis. While our teaching focus is on the past, in order to reach the public today we need to use what we know about them to encourage an interest in history.

Our spring programs will take us on the road in March and May and we will focus on the Revolutionary War battle sites in April. A trip to Reed Gold Mine is scheduled for March and a field trip to Fort Defiance in Lenoir is planned for May. Our last meeting this spring will be the annual picnic and we will return to Rosedale for that event. You will find more details in the Dandelion. Do come and join us!

## **Financial Situation**

At present, in uncommitted funds, we have about \$22,000.00 in our treasury. Committed funds donated specifically for Settler's Cemetery and a donation for the Captain Jack bronze earmark about \$20,000.00. An annual budget expenditure of about \$2,500.00 is provided to help operate the Docents program. We run a \$200.00 annual deficit on the programs and meals. As a volunteer organization, you can see that we run on fumes! In an effort to put us on a better footing, we need to raise the meal prices by \$1.00 per person

to reduce the program deficit. The new meal price will be \$12.00 for Seniors and \$14.00 for non-Seniors. We also need to raise dues a few dollars a year to cover increased printing and postage costs. See the new membership fees in the form. Your MHA is the best value for history lovers in the County! If it is to continue, we need your cooperation and the Board would certainly welcome any charitable contributions you would care to make to help us serve present or future programs and projects! This is where you can

help even if you cannot serve in any other capacity!
