Dinner Program Topic will be:

The Charlotte Trail of History and Capt. James Jack

Judge Chase Saunders will be speaking on "The Charlotte Trail of History and Capt. James Jack." Several years ago Judge Saunders envisioned placing a series of bronze statues of historical Charlotte figures in public spaces to tell the story of Charlotte. He has been working towards the implementation of this vision ever since. Most recently, the Little Sugar Creek Greenway presented an opportunity to locate these statues by the creation of the Charlotte Trail of History. He envisions a bronze statue of Capt. James Jack as being the first of many to tell this story. It would be a statue important to the remembrance of the Mecklenburg Declaration of Independence. Several articles over the last few months have appeared in the Charlotte Observer favorably reviewing the concept. He has written about this project in "Remarks from the President" in this newsletter. Judge Saunders will give a masterful, beautiful and exciting presentation which will bring this vision to life.

Judge Saunders graduated from the University of North Carolina, Chapel Hill, with a B.A. in History-English and then received his J.D. from the University of North Carolina, Chapel Hill. He began his career as a judge in 1976 and retired as Senior Resident Superior Court Judge of the 26th Judicial District in 1997. He is currently in private practice. Over his career, Judge Saunders has received many awards and commendations, including the North Carolina Order of the Long Leaf Pine for services rendered to the State.

In addition to active involvement with the North Carolina Bar Association and publishing professional articles, Judge Saunders has been active in the Charlotte Rotary Club, is a member of the YMCA Community Planning Committee, a member of the Dowd House Advisory Committee, a board member of the Levine Museum of the New South as well as current president of the Mecklenburg Historical Association.

Also, Charles Fagan, a young artist, plans to attend the dinner. Mr. Fagan has just finished an oil of Capt. Jack leaving Charlotte which will be featured in prints to be distributed by the May 20th Society. He has painted the Presidents, has completed bronzes for the George Bush (Senior) Library in Houston, Texas, has work in the National Gallery and also aboard the aircraft carrier Ronald Reagan! His most recent project was the completion of the official portrait of Mrs. Barbara Bush that hangs in the White House. He has three small children and moved to Charlotte because he and his wife thought it would be a great place in which to raise them.


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

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Remarks from the President...



Two remarkable events:

By the time we hold our next meeting, it will follow the most important celebration of the Mecklenburg Declaration in nearly thirty

years and mark the emergence of another great historical society, the May 20th Society. That organization is being organized by new, young and spirited visionaries such as Charles Jonas, grandson of Congressman Charles Jonas, and David Adams, a member of the MHA and Vice President of the Charlotte Museum of History. It is tapping members of the business, historic consortium, civic, and professional communities of Charlotte to rejuvenate the celebration of May 20th on a scale not seen since early in the last century.

This year will mark its entry upon the scene. They think big and have arranged to block off the Square for a portion of the afternoon as events unfold. The MHA is joining in their efforts this year through events planning, docents and re-enactor participation, exhibitor participation, and a five hundred dollar contribution to their essay or art contest. The schedule of events will be included in this newsletter. It will include speeches, proclamations, ex-

hibitions, a band, and social events! Opportunities to participate as sponsor-hosts through personal contributions are welcomed. Call Marty Viser at 704.563.4871 to see how you can become involved. We need to encourage these new young Charlotte leaders who have assumed the responsibility of fueling those embers which Kay Majeski, Linda Dalton, the MHA docents, Jim Williams with his Reenactors, and so many of you from this organization have kept alive over the years with great dedication. These young people deserve our support, so please consider a contribution.

So the first remarkable event is that of the passing of the celebratory baton to a new generation. The second remarkable event is complementary. It is the acceptance of a plan for the development of a portion of the Little Sugar Creek Greenway. The Greenway Board, chaired by CPCC President Tony Zeiss approved a plan which calls for the creation of a Charlotte Trail of History to run from Central Piedmont Community College along a newlylandscaped and uncovered Little Sugar Creek to Morehead Street. With a skyline of Charlotte in the background, the vision calls for a series of bronze statues to recognizes important people in the history of this community visible as one strolls that portion of the Greenway. This is a longterm project, a work-in-progress; however, of fundamental interest to the MHA is the recognition that a strong statement acknowledging our Revolutionary War roots should be made. And the way to do it is with a bronze statute of Captain James Jack!

At the meeting, I will make a power point presentation concerning this project. This is a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity for the MHA as an organization and members to take part in raising the money necessary to leave a lasting tribute to our ancestors. The large bronze piece will be prominently aligned, be accessible to visitors, and bear the names of contributing organizations and individuals at certain levels. It will be a legacy project for us both individually and collectively. This project will cost some money but will be well worth it!

The passing of the celebratory baton; the Captain James Jack bronze project; two goals of the MHA which are gaining traction and will make our city a better place in which to live. Support them both and find out more about the latter at the May 23rd meeting.
