sulting from our American Civil War in the South.



# <u>Historic Rosedale Plantation</u>, 3427 North Tryon

#### Saturday, November 7th.

Annual Oyster Roast fund raising event. Fun for the whole family and excellent Oysters.

Saturday, November 28, the Satur day after Thanksgiving, A 19th Century Thanksgiving Celebration. The year is 1844 and the residents, black and white, are celebrating a bountiful harvest. This is a family celebration as the national holiday had not yet been instituted. You will see these people in their natural setting and eavesdrop on their conversations.

# Historic Latta Plantation,

Huntersville

**Saturday and Sunday, November 27-28**, from 10 am to 4 pm, A Plantation Christmas. Start the holiday season by stepping back in time for a 19th century Christmas celebration.

Tour the plantation and learn about early American Christmas traditions. **Saturday, December 5**, from 6 to 9 pm, Candlelight Christmas at the Plantation. Walk through the plantation by candlelight and witness Christmas celebrations of the early 19th century in the barn, plantation house, kitchen, and slave cabin.

# Charlotte Museum of History and Hezekiah Alexander Homesite

Saturday, November 21, 6 to 9 pm, Civil War Lantern Tour. Take an indepth look into the conditions, hopes, and fears of common foot soldiers of the war. Progress through different camp settings on the grounds and see the campfires, smell the cooking, and listen to the stories from the period. Tours, conducted by a Charlottebased Civil War reenactment unit, are based on letters, diaries, and other Civil War documents.

**Sunday, November 1** from 1 to 4 pm, Living History Sunday. Learn about traditional textile production, and its development throughout the years. **Sunday, December 6** from 1 to 4 pm, Living History Sunday. Experience traditional photography, and its growth to where we are today. Demonstrators, vendors, and experts in the field of photography will be available to museum visitors.

# <u>President James K. Polk State Historic Site</u>, *Pineville*

Saturday, November 14, at 10 am. Celebrating Veterans Day: Life aboard the USS James K. Polk. Join Clarence Jordan, former crewman of the USS James K. Polk, as he discusses his time on board and what it meant to serve on this submarine. Registration required Call (704) 889-7145 to register.

Saturday, December 12, Christmas in Mecklenburg County with the Polks. Visitors will see a living history vignette in the main house. Each building will be decorated in the 19th century style. Come and learn about food and customs from Christmas in 1802.

Mary Kratt has won several awards for her writing in both regional history and poetry. She has won the St. Andrews Writer in Community Award, the Brockman Poetry Book Award, and the Peace History Book Prize, to name a few. Some of her best known

books are the prizewinning poetry book, "Small Potatoes", "The Only Thing I Fear is A Cow and A Drunken Man", and "Spirit Going Barefoot". Her books about Charlotte include and in addition to "Charlotte, North Carolina: A Brief History", "New South Women: Twentieth Century Women of Charlotte, North Carolina" and "Legacy: The Myers Park Story". If you were not present for the meeting and her lecture, we urge you to get a copy of her book at area bookstores and enjoy the stories of our Queen City and its beginnings.
