Dinner Program Topic will be:

The Geography of Charlotte

Every city has a story. David Erdman, a local attorney, tells Charlotte's story "from the ground up" in a 50-minute presentation, entitled: The Geography of Charlotte.

Mr. Erdman's PowerPoint show and lecture portray the development of Charlotte from its beginning as a trading-path crossroads. He examines the natural and built components of the City of Charlotte through 160 projected images and informed commentary.

Whether you are a lifelong resident or a newcomer, you will see the city

from an entirely new perspective. Mr. Erdman's fast-paced presentation, which is supported by numerous maps, photographs and historical facts, will further enlighten even the most knowledgeable Charlottean.

David Erdman was born in North Carolina and grew up near New Bern in Craven County. He attended Duke University earning a degree in Bio-Medical Engineering and then attended Georgetown University Law School. He moved to Charlotte in 1976 and formed the law firm of Erdman and Hockfield.

You will enjoy Mr. Erdman's comprehensive exploration of the forces that created and nurture this city.





New Book: The Sarah Frew Davidson Journal



The MHA Docents are pleased to announce the publication of *A Life in Antebellum Charlotte; The Private Journal of Sarah Frew Davidson, 1837.* Sarah was the unmarried daughter of Senator William Davidson, and a sister of Harriet Caldwell whose plantation home is now Historic Rosedale. Sarah's journal, kept for just under a year, was passed down in the family to Mary Louise Davidson and Alice Abel who generously donated it to the manuscript collection at UNCC. A group of Rosedale staff and MHA docents began transcribing the journal about five years ago; then Karen

McConnell, Janet Dyer, and Ann Williams took on the task of researching and writing additional material to provide background and context. Last spring these editors contracted with the History Press of Charleston, SC to publish Sarah's journal complete with an introduction, annotations, maps, and biographical sketches of Sarah and her closest associates. Also included is a beautiful forward by Mary Kratt.

The journal reveals a wonderfully intimate portrait of Charlotte and surrounding plantations in 1837, a pivotal year in our history. Gold mining was in its heyday, and the mint was under construction. Mining experts and entrepreneurs were drawn to the area and became part of Sarah's social circle. Sarah also wrote about plantation life; she taught slave children to read, cared lovingly for ill and dying slaves, yet firmly believed that servitude of Negroes was biblically ordained. Sarah wrote passionately about

her religious convictions and worries. She felt personally responsible for the souls of all she knew. Her journal is a fascinating read.

The book is currently being printed, and should be released by mid November. It will retail for \$19.99. Karen, Janet and Ann agreed to purchase 300 copies wholesale to be resold at historic sites, and at book talks and signings for interested groups. The MHA Board generously offered to underwrite this initial purchase with all proceeds to benefit Historic Rosedale. In addition, royalties on all books sold at bookstores and elsewhere will benefit the historic site. We can take advance orders, and hope to have the books in our hands by the November14th dinner meeting. Also keep us in mind if you need a speaker or program for you book clubs, garden clubs, etc. When the 300 copies are sold, we can reorder from the publisher as needed.

MHA Newsletter now Available by Email

Starting last year we asked our members for their email addresses and started compiling an email list. Then in July we asked those members on the email list if they would like to receive the MHA Newsletter by email instead of, or in addition to, US Postal mail.

Today there are a total of 197 active MHA members (19 of them are lifetime members and 16 support MHA at the Patron level). Of these, 95 have given us an email address and 44 have asked to re-

ceive the MHA newsletter by email. The emailing of the newsletter is starting this month and will result in a savings to MHA of about 22% of our printing and postage expenses or about \$167 annual savings.

We also use this email list to inform these members of upcoming events of interest to the history community. Often this is the only way to get the word out because, by the time the newsletter comes out, the event has passed.

This newsletter is being sent to all of the MHA members on the email list. Also, in the last month there have been 5 email announcements sent to the list.
